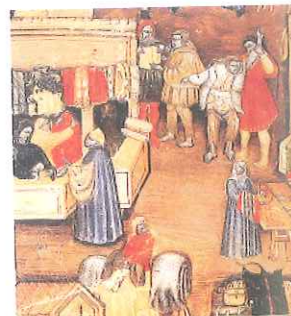

El Programa de Cooperación Transfronteriza España – Portugal se puso en marcha en la primera edición de las iniciativas Interreg, la cual comenzó en 1990 y se desarrolló hasta 1993. Desde entonces este programa ha venido reeditándose en los sucesivos periodos de programación en el marco de Interreg II (1994-1999) e Interreg III (2000-2006). La experiencia de las tres primeras ediciones se saldó con un total de 186 proyectos. El balance del periodo 2007-2013 ha sido especialmente importante, ya que durante el mismo se creó la Euroregión Alentejo-Algarve-Andalucía, y se aprobaron 39 proyectos con participación andaluza.
